## **Oxford Local Pubs Week**

With the most recent Beer & Pub Association report highlighting that 5 pubs are closing every day, CAMRA has to do more than ever to support local pubs through these difficult times.

CAMRA has launched a new campaign called Local Pubs Week for 2009 that aims to raise the profile and importance of pubs in the community; encourage people of all ages and backgrounds to use community pubs and visit the pub more often than they currently do; and



encourage pubs to organise events during the week to entice more trade

The Oxford Branch has chosen 16 to 24 May as its local pubs week+. Events are currently in the planning stage but will include a launch event on Saturday 16, a pub games evening at the Mason's Arms on Thursday 21, and a branch social at the Turf Tayern on Saturday 23.

In addition to the events planned, we are also having a Local Pubs Trail to encourage drinkers to visit a selection of the many splendid locals in our branch area. The idea will be to visit a number of the selected pubs which are spread across are area, collecting stickers on a trail card as

you go, and then returning the completed cards to us for a chance to win one of a number of prizes.

There are some 300 pubs in the branch area. Many of these are splendid locals that don't receive much publicity or recognition. The aim of the trail is to highlight some good pubs serving great beer that people often might not think to visit.

Details of the events and trail will be added the branch diary page on the website and circulated to the events mailing list. Trail cards will be available from all those pubs included.

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## inn and around oxford



It was with great sadness that the branch learned in early March of the death of John Dunkley. recently landlord of the Ampleforth Arms in Risinghurst. Before moving to there late last vear, John had previously run the Chester Arms and some vears ago the Marlborough House in Grandpont, He established the Chester Arms as a popular. family-friendly pub with a lively programme of events, and good beer. He was always a genial and welcoming host whenever the branch visited, be it for a branch meeting or a gathering at one of the Chester's summer beer festivals. In recent months he has been of great help to the local branch in our press campaign to highlight the difficulties facing local pubs. He will be missed. and we would like to take this opportunity to extend our sympathy and condolences to the family, friends and regulars that he leaves behind.

The **Red Lion**, Old Marston, is another

victim of Greene King's ludicrous policy of pricing their own licensees out of business. We're very sad to see Keith leave after all his hard work there.

The **Duke of Monmouth** has now reopened under a new tenancy, the sign outside advertising opening hours 9am -12.15am and "Swiss Cuisine". The kitchen has been extensively refitted, reflecting a greater emphasis on high quality food by the new management, but most of the bar areas are unchanged and nondining drinkers are definitely welcome. The cask beers are limited to Greene King IPA and Abbot, but both were in excellent condition when sampled recently.

(Greene King) in Witney is currently closed apparently pending the replacement of the landlord. This large estate style pub has

recently lacked inspiration. On a recent visit the only cask ales was a poor IPA.

The Saddlers at New

Yatt, although an eating place, serves good ales and using the Marstons portfolio should see a varying choice.

#### The Evenlode,

Eynsham, was reportedly to be demolished but planning permission has been currently refused. This is a large freestanding building on the A40 with lots of garden/lawn surrounding it. It seems to have had a multitude of operators in recent times and tried hard to push food.

Around the corner, **The Star** was closed at the
start of April but has now
reopened under Admiral
Taverns with a temporary
manager from Carlisle.
There is likely to be a
change from an eating to
a drinkers' public house.

The Boot Inn, at nearby Barnard Gate, has purchased The Bell at Standlake, which was a GK undertaking and has been closed for 6 months. Changes will be to return it to a traditional style pub, hopefully in operation toward the end of the summer.

## Abingdon crawl 1

On a Saturday afternoon in late February a small group branch members and friends gathered for an Abingdon centre pub crawl. Several of the active Abingdon members and some of their friends came along. but the turnout from further afield was rather disappointing, to be honest, with only myself from Oxford and one member from Kidlington braving the 20 minute X3 bus ride south

This is the first of three planned Abingdon visits, which together are intended to form a comprehensive survey of the pubs of the town – the first that we have done since 2005.

#### Brewery Tap, Ock Street

For the meeting point our organiser had chosen one of the established CAMRA favourites in the town. The Brewery Tap is well known to the branch, having featured regularly in the Good Beer Guide in recent years, and hosted a number of local branch meetings. The

pub was created in 1993 by Morland, by converting three Grade II listed town houses. The attractive interior features panelled walls, stone floors and real fire.



There was live football playing on several TV screens around the pub. for those who wanted to watch, but these were not intrusive or distracting. We were met with a good welcome, and I took the opportunity to lunch on the special of the day (an excellent beef stew) before the day's drinking. There were five real ales on offer, three from the Greene King stable (Hardy and Hanson's Bitter, Hardy and Hanson's Olde Trip, and Morland Original) and two quests (Batemans XXXB and Holdon's Golden Glow). All the beer sampled was in good form. Most of the

party concentrated on the guest beers, since we knew that we would be seeing a lot of Greene King products throughout the afternoon!

### The Grapes, High Street

The Grapes was shut, and had one of the all-too-familiar Greene King "Business Opportunity" estate agent boards on display.

#### Blue Boar, Bath Street

We paid a very brief visit, just long enough to establish that no real ale was on sale and moved on. When the survey party visited in 2005 they commented that the pub "did little to excite", but at least they found cask conditioned Tetley Bitter at £1.59 per pint...

### Black Swan, Bath Street

Another ex-Morland Greene King pub, the Black Swan comes across as a rough and ready basic town centre boozer, with sports on various large screen TVs. Keg lager seems to be the main focus. There are three handpumps but only one was in operation when we visited, and I am told this is the normal state of affairs. The one beer on offer was Morland Original, and we had a swift round of halves.



The beer quality was average. One aspect that is worthy of positive comment is that a glass with an oversized head was topped up by the lady who serving, on her own initiative, entirely unprompted by any comment from us. Thumbs up on the weights and measures front, but apart from that there was not really anything to make us linger in the pub.

#### Plough, Stert Street

Next, a change from the "formerly Morland, now Greene King" pattern: the Plough is an ex-Morrells pub which is now a Greene King pub! It is on the corner of the old station yard (though the branch line that used

to connect Abingdon to the Great Western mainline at Radley is long gone, unfortunately). Another busy, single-bar



town centre pub, featuring fruit machines. quiz machines and the Saturday racing on big screen TV. There is more of a real-ale offering here though, with two Greene King brewed beers on sale: IPA and Hardy and Hanson's Olde Trip. I had the Greene King IPA and found it to be in good form, with a nice clean and hoppy taste. This matches what the review from 2005 says it is encouraging to find that one of the recommended pubs of our last survey is still serving a good pint four vears later.

## Punchbowl, Market Place

The Punchbowl is one of the fine old buildings of Abingdon, dating originally to the 1570s. with an excellent position looking over the market square. It has been a pub since 1775. and has been known as the Coach and Horses and the Fleur de Levs in the past. The front bar has a bit of a reputation for being rowdy - in his 2005 write-up Matt Bullock describes "a posse of drunken people, all singing loudly along to the jukebox, and a few who were dancing wildly too". Although it didn't sound quite that lively when we visited, we headed straight for the lounge bar at the back (which has an entrance on East St Helen Street).



The snug lounge is attractively wooden panelled. Like so many of the pubs of Abingdon the Punchbowl is ex-Morland and now

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Greene King, and the beers on offer were Morland Original and Hardy and Hanson's Olde Trip. I had the Morland Original, and found it to be extremely good - one of the best examples of the beer that I have had in a long time. In my opinion Original has not fared well since Greene King closed the Morland brewery and moved the brewing of the "Morland" branded beers to Bury St Edmunds in 2000: the GK version is generally too sweet, bland and is often inconsistent in taste and colour. The pint that I had in the Punchbowl, however. seemed to have real echoes of the astringent. bitter beer that Morland used to brew.

Stocks Bar, Bridge St

And finally, a respite from Greene King beers! In the last few years the Stocks, the pub attached to the Crown and Thistle Hotel, has become a popular part of the Abingdon real ale scene. They have recently made changes to the cellar and beer lines to accommodate more real beer, and now feature 8 hand-pumps on the bar.

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Beers on offer at the day of our visit included: Brakspear Bitter: Marsons Old Empire: Slaters Premium: White Horse Porter: White Horse Village Idiot: Wychwood Dirty Tackle; Wychwood Hobaoblin. The exact beer line up changes all the time. If that were not enough. the pub was also serving 6 different real ciders/ perries from Westons: 1st Quality; Bounds Brand: Country Perry: Old Rosie: Traditional Scrumpy; Vintage Organic. Admittedly some of that impressive range was probably left over from the pub's recent winter ales

festival rather than being typical, but there is a definite commitment to real cider along side the real ale which is excellent to see. We started off with a round of White Horse Porters this is a beautiful beer. and was served in excellent condition. Despite it having been quite a long day by this point, we felt obliged to do quality control on several of the other beers after that, and found them to be similarly well-kept. After that there was a photo opportunity featuring the eponymous stocks. "It seemed like a good idea at the time...".



## Cricketer's Arms Festival

Cricketer's Arms Beer and Sausage Festival, Friday 20th - Sunday 22nd February

The Cricketer's Arms in Littleworth ran a "Sausage Festival" last vear. This sounded intriguing, but I was away the weekend in question and so missed the event. This year they announced that they would follow up with a Beer and Sausage Festival: two of my favourite things in one event - there was no way I was going to miss out this time around! The obvious day to go would have been Saturday. Unfortunately there was a CAMRA Regional Meeting in Henley already arranged for Saturday 21st, which several branch officers were already committed to attending. We therefore arranged a branch social for the Sunday afternoon.

There is no direct bus from Oxford to Littleworth on a Sunday (weekday and Saturday daytimes one can catch the Heyfordian 103/104), so several of us caught

the U1 to Wheatley and then made the 10 or 15 minute stroll down the road to Littleworth, When we arrived we found that the Abingdon contingent of the branch were already at the pub. having persuaded an unfortunate one of their number to take on the role of "designated driver". We joined them at their table and started sizing up both the beer list and the sausage menu.



The beers were all sourced from local independent brewers within 36 miles of the pub - a collection of breweries which the Cricketer's calls the "six sixes portfolio". This emphasis on sourcing good quality local beer has strong resonances with the CAMRA "LocAle" accreditation scheme, promoting the reduction of "beer miles" and the support of local breweries, though the Cricketer's were doing it before we jumped on the band-waggon! The breweries represented were: Appleford (brewery to pub: 12.4 miles): Archers (Swindon, B2P: 34.5 miles): Best Mates (Wantage, B2P: 18.7) miles); Hook Norton (B2P: 27.3 miles); Loddon (Dunsden, B2P: 24.2 miles): Marlow (B2P: 22.7); Old Bog (Headington, B2P: 4.0 miles); Tring (B2P: 24.0 miles); Vale (Brill, B2P: 9.9 miles): West Berkshire (Yattendon, B2P: 24.6); White Horse (Stanford-in-the-Vale. B2P: 20.5). The Hook Norton beers were on hand-pumps, the rest of the beers were dispensed "on gravity" straight from the casks, which were stillaged in a room at the back of the bub.



I am told that the festival did very good trade on Friday and Saturday, so we were quite lucky to find all the beers were still available when we turned up on the last day. We were warned by those in the know that several of the casks were running low, and the beers did start to run out during the afternoon. The most popular (first to sell out) was the "Good Old Boy Extra", from West Berks. Once we had secured a few halves of the most endangered of the beers that we wanted to trv. it was time to turn our

attention to food. The menu consisted of a wide variety of specialist sausages, all served with mash and gravy. Unfortunately I can't remember all the flavours on offer, and neglected to make proper notes (hopefully excusable, having sampled most of the twelve different beers in three hours!). I do recall that I had some excellent pork chipolatas, and that John Mackie greatly enjoyed his Lamb and Mint sausages. John had received a tip-off that the sticky toffee pudding was particularly good,

and was disappointed to discover that this was sold out. Personally I was happy to just get stuck back into the beers for "dessert"!

The beers were all interesting brews, and were served in fine form. The event was very well attended, and it was a real pleasure to see the locals supporting their pub in significant numbers. We hope to see more of the same in the future!

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## Around the county

Visiting the 130 pubs in the branch area in west Oxfordshire is a useful and enjoyable way of finding out what is going on in the ever changing pub scene. Car sharing and the odd Minibus trip by branch members is a regular event. To find out more give us a call. A recent trip to four pubs turned up the following.

Ducklington, almost a suburb of Witney, is a pretty sprawling and affluent village with 2 different and very old pubs. The Bell for many years a Courage house now run by Greene King is one of the oldest pubs in the county with parts of the building dating from 1150. This mainly locals, comfortable. friendly well run house has a real fire and a rare real 60s/70s jukebox. The Bell looks like an old farmhouse and on entering you notice on the old bar top Real Old Rosie cider along with the normal Greene King products, IPA and Morland Original. Food is served from an imaginative menu.


Around the corner. The Strickland Arms a Walworth's house for the last 20 years comes into view looking very much the 17th century farmhouse pub it is. Dispensing Wadworth 6X and Henrys IPA in good condition the Strickland appears to be a well run food pub but never the less manages to successfully run darts and aunt sally teams. Local drinkers are well cared for in this low beamed two bar building along with summer time outside drinking areas front and back. The landlord has been here for 10 years now and after reminiscing previous years drinking experiences it was apparent that he was involved in the legendary Gales pubs - The Pack Horse, Pack Saddle and The Fox near Mapledurham, Reading with myself in the early 90s.

Moving on to **The Lord Kitchener** (splendid name) at Curbridge (The Merry Horn closed in the 80s), this 18th century long fronted former

Morrells was well known for fine food even back in the 80s. Now just another Greene King pub the Kitchener still serves good food and is part of the local community.

The final call of the night, The Masons Arms. has been a free house for many years and has seen several changes of landlord in recent years. The other pub in the village is another typical Greene King food pub The Chequers - the cosy Carpenters closed 30 vears ago. The Masons another old stone farmhouse type of pub is very much a comfortable locals haunt serving 3 differing guest beers in reasonable condition, these being on the night Highgate Irish Whisky Ale (a rare brewery in these parts) along with Sharps Doom Bar and Wychwood Paddys Stout Well worth a visit!

Look out for more of these informative tours and tell us of any news, good and bad, and correct my mistakes.

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## **Stocks Beer Festival**



The Stocks Bar in the Crown & Thistle Hotel in Abingdon held the second of its four beer festivals planned for 2009 from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 6th April. This turned out to be their most successful festival yet, enhanced by live music every day, first-rate ale and with the bonus of excellent weather.

There were a very good selection of beers, many from local breweries, and a range of good ciders. The Friday evening was so well attended that nearly half the festival ale stock was consumed, however emergency deliveries were arranged by the bar manager, increasing the festival from over 22 barrels to 39, all of which were dispensed by the end of the festival.

the Sunday, all of which brought in people from the local area and beyond.

There were some outstanding and unusual beers including Vanilla Porter from the Box Steam Brewery and Sump, from the relatively new Pitstop Brewery in nearby Grove, which at 7% is a dangerous brew for the unsuspecting.

The festival had a welcoming and friendly atmosphere, created by a wide range of people of all age groups. Many Oxford branch members attended at least one of the sessions and we all look forward to the next Stocks beer festival later this year.

The live music included jazz on the Friday evening, a blues band on the Saturday and a great swing band (pictured) playing in the courtyard on



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The nearby, **Black Horse** continues to have excellent and changing ales. It is interesting how effective a good British welcome can be to a pub: the landlady is usually customer-side and the endless supply of roast peanuts on the bar are remarkably moreish.

The landlord from **The Bell** moved to the Red Lion at Northmoor. The week before Easter, his daughter Liz, with partner Derek Weir as landlord, started to breathe new life into it. Initially there will be London Pride and

Ringwood Bitter, but it will vary. A third pump will be available when new lines are installed.

Further up the hill, **The Griffin** is evolving into a very gratifying tavern under a landlord whose family have eons of experience.

The Clanfield Tavern, has 3 well kept and ever changing good ales. His encouragement to nonale drinkers is for them to try his range by offering third pint glasses.
